# 2022 in Review: Advancing Our Mission through a Deeper Understanding of Court Processes, Data, and Resource Needs

The COVID-19 pandemic tested Maine courts in unprecedented ways and, in doing so, revealed chronic resource deficiencies. At the height of the pandemic in 2020, and during a resurgence in 2021, we took on the challenge to innovate while keeping courthouses open to the public. In 2022 we expanded and improved initiatives introduced during the pandemic, such as the use of remote proceedings for many types of cases and court events. However, we also realized that to make further progress, it was crucial to gain a deeper understanding of case data and resource needs.

### "Working the Problem" - A deeper look at the case backlog

During the pandemic, the overall number of cases in Maine courts rose at a faster rate than they could be resolved, creating what we frequently refer to as the "case backlog." In 2022, the Judicial Branch took a deep look at the data on pending cases and found case clearance rates had been declining even before the pandemic. Cases are now more complex to try and take more resources to resolve. For example, despite a modest decrease in overall criminal filings, felonies are an increasing portion of the cases filed. Failures to appear and continuance rates have increased, especially in felonies. Other factors in complexity and delay include high rates of mental health and substance use disorders. The opioid epidemic and substance use disorders drive not only drug crimes but also crimes involving property and violence. In more recent years, the number of Child Protective cases filed has nearly doubled. The lack of constitutionally required counsel has contributed to an already overburdened justice system.

In the fall of 2022, the Judicial Branch partnered with the National Center for State Courts (NCSC) to conduct a study on how Maine judges and clerks spend their time. Detailed records were kept to get quantifiable evidence to support what we have long known – Maine's courts are severely understaffed. Preliminary findings from the NCSC suggest we need far more resources to fulfill our mission.

To address this shortage of resources, the Judicial Branch has asked the Legislature for more personnel, including clerks, judges, and marshals, to allow our trial courts to run at greater capacity. We continue to pursue other innovations to support and strengthen Judicial Branch operations.

#### **Use of Remote Technologies to Help Move & Resolve Cases**

Remote hearings and pre-trial conferences by Zoom and/or telephone for some case types became a permanent feature in our

court system in 2022. Our Violations Bureau is now on a 100% Zoom platform, with presiding judges at the Violations Bureau in Lewiston. Litigants wishing to challenge a civil traffic violation can do so remotely without having to travel to court.

#### **Maine eCourts**

In 2022, we reorganized our efforts to expand our electronic filing case management system, which, when fully implemented, will provide easier access to the courts and case filings without having to come to a courthouse. We intend bring the family and civil case type package now in use in Bangor to Lewiston/Auburn later in 2023.

### **DEI, Accessibility, and Improved Process**

In 2022, we started an internal Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) working group to increase diversity and inclusion and decrease implicit bias in the Judicial Branch. One of the accomplishments of this working group was to facilitate the hiring of a court intern from the Lewiston Somali community. There is now a standing court committee in the works to address DEI issues.

#### Additional initiatives in 2022 include:

- Increased training for judges in the use of treatment courts and veterans' courts;
- Enhanced use of mental health dockets to better address the significant mental health challenges to the administration of justice;
- Expanded use of the ShareFile platform to allow for email transmission of filings in criminal cases;
- Improved language access, physical access, and accommodations for those with hearing loss or other disabilities; and
- Development of resources, practices, and policies to better support self-represented litigants and court users and facilitate their engagement in their court proceedings.
   New materials include videos about the court process and handouts that explain how to start certain common case types.
- Work continued on the new York Judicial Center in Biddeford, which will bring the
  District Courts in Springvale, York, and Biddeford, as well as the Superior Court in
  Alfred, together in one modern, fully accessible, and energy efficient facility.

The Judicial Branch remained committed to providing access to justice to Maine people throughout 2022, as we will in the years to come.




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

### **FY22 REVENUE**






